Contemporary Social Theory

Course code: 300618 Spring semester

Course Description:

This course provides an overview of the major contemporary sociological theories. We will focus on functionalism, conflict theory, exchange theory, rational choice theory, game theory, symbolic interactionism, dramaturgy, phenomenological sociology, ethnomethodology, critical theory (Jurgen Habermas), structuralism and poststructuralism, structuration theory and the work of Pierre Bourdieu. Particular emphasis is given on the conceptual frameworks and theoretical debates (e.g. agency and structure, social constructionism and realism) which define social theory, and contributions to contemporary social analysis.

Objectives:

By the end of the course students should be able to:

- critically assess the key ideas and the differences between diverse theoretical approaches,
- appropriately apply these theories to empirical settings.
